

12-Month Teaching Term Position in Psychology

The School of Arts and Social Science at Grenfell Campus, Memorial University invites applications for a 12-month teaching term position within Psychology's Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Science programs at the rank of Lecturer or Assistant Professor. The position will begin on August 1st, 2018.

Along with courses in introductory psychology, the successful candidate must be prepared to teach courses in animal behaviour, learning, and neurophysiology within the existing program. A Ph.D. or near completion (ABD) is required as is relevant undergraduate teaching experience.

In electronic form, applicants should submit a letter of application, curriculum vitae, and a teaching dossier (including evidence of teaching effectiveness and sample course outlines if available). Applicants should also arrange for three letters of reference to be sent electronically to: Dean, School of Arts and Social Science, Grenfell Campus, Memorial University of Newfoundland, sassdean@grenfell.mun.ca. Applications will begin to be reviewed on Friday, March 16th, 2018 and review will continue until the position is filled.
